Charlottesville, Va., Dec. 22.—President Alderman of the University of Virginia, has received a letter from the French Ambassador at Washington, announcing that he had been instructed, on behalf of his government to present to the University, a bust of LaFayette, which is expected to arrive here within a few days. The bust was reproduced from the original by Hudson.

Alabama Militia Will Participate in Inauguration.

Mobile, Ala., Dec. 22.—General Louis V. Clark, of Birmingham, commander-in-chief of the Alabama National Guard, stated tonight that plans have been started for the participation of the Alabama National Guard in President Roosevelt's inauguration. The plans have been favorably received in Washington through Major W. F. Tebbett, representing the board of staff officers.

Mr. Mitchell Promoted.

A recent issue of the Star and Herald of Panama says: The friends of Mason E. Mitchell and they are many on the Isthmus, will be delighted to learn that by his hard work during the past six months as cashier of the Isthmian Canal Commission, he has gained a well deserved promotion. As cashier Mr. Mitchell made many warm friends here in Panama, and we are glad to know that his promotion does not take him to Washington, as was at first expected. He is now in Colon as guest of Captain Miller and the officers of the United States Ship Columbia, where he expects to meet Mr. Moody who is expected to arrive from New Orleans today. Mr. Mitchell will enter upon his new duties about January 1st.

Football Player Sued by Father.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 21.—Just as he was about to turn over \$30,000 to Frederick Hall, White, the Harvard football player, who reached his majority yesterday, and who inherited nearly \$200,000 from the estate of his mother, James Kingsley Blake, of this city, was served with papers restraining him from doing so. Mr. Blake is administrator of Mrs. White's estate, and the restraining action is brought by Josiah J. White the young man's father, who sues for \$25,000, alleging various grounds of indebtedness.

Boy Accidentally Killed.

Rutherford College, Dec. 22.—Stawall Hill, a boy fifteen years old, accidentally shot and killed himself yesterday, while returning to the house from the woods near-by. While shaking a pile of brush his foot slipped, causing the hammer of the gun to strike a log, thus discharging the entire load into his neck. Stawall was a student of Rutherford College and a boy of bright intellect.

Detectives are Sentenced.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 22.—City Detectives W. H. Green, John De Saye, Frank McMahan and Robert Goodman, were today adjudged guilty of contempt by the Supreme Court for irregularities at the late election, and were each sentenced to serve six months in jail and pay a \$100 fine and costs.

F. A. Hull For National Bank Examiner.

Washington, Dec. 21.—Chairman Rollins was at the White House again yesterday before leaving for home and introduced Fred Hull of Asheville to the president. Rollins is urging Hull's appointment as national bank examiner, and in this move has the endorsement of Judges Pritchard and Keller, who have observed Hull's work in connection with the First National bank. Cashier Hull's friends are numerous and will actively insist on his appointment if any vacancy occurs in the near future in this branch of service. While at the depot Rollins made inquiries about the body of Lieut. Pritchard and it was stated that nothing had been heard since the remains were shipped from San Francisco. It is further stated that owing to the blizzard in the west, which has demoralized all trains, that the body of young Pritchard might not arrive at Marshall until after the 22nd.

Undertaker's Queer Dilemma.

Norristown, Pa., Dec. 21.—That an undertaker's lot is sometimes not a happy one was amply demonstrated in the experience of one of these functionaries today. Almost simultaneously he received three telegrams, in substance about as follows:

HER HUSBAND.

Send remains of my mother, Mrs. Eliza Connors, to me, in Philadelphia.

HER DAUGHTER.

The full name and address of the claimant was, of course, given in each case, and the subject of the three telegrams was a patient who had just died at the insane asylum here, and been turned over to the local undertaker. The man of mourning kept the wires hot with messages for a while, and finally sent the casket and its occupant to the husband, at Poughkeepsie, New York.
