New Resources For Rural People Provided By EO Act Amendment

Act signed November 8th by President Johnson will provide additional and much needed resources for hardpressed, low-income rural peoarm income to start small businesses.

"This important Economic Opportunity Act amendment ncreases from \$2,500 to \$3,-500 the maximum loan that the Farmers Home Adinistration, of the United States Department of Agriculture, can make to individual farmers or other rural residents at the bottom of the econo-mic ladder," Clarence H. Sink County Supervisor of the Davie County agency stated. The amendment also authorizes additional credit to borrowers so long as their total outstanding indebtedness for an eco-nomic opportunity loan does not exceed \$3,500."

Mr. Sink explained that since this office of Economic Opportunity rural loan program started in January 1965, the Farmers Home Administration extended credit totaling \$2,-142,690 to over 1575 rural
