Davie.

The above recommendations were formulated by the Citizens Committee for Better Schools after an intensive thirteen-months' study of our ele-mentary schools. The 49 members of the committee de-termined these needs through numerous meetings for the purpose of determining the needs of the schools; through visits to each elementary school for a first-hand examination of existing facilities; through a meeting with the N. C. Department of Educa-tion Evaluation Team to hear their Engineering and Curri-culum evaluation of the Davie County Schools, and through the Committees' own compiled report of the existing building and curriculum needs as they determined by their own investigations.

The Committee did not recommend any renovation or expansion of the present elementary schools. Due to the age and condition of these schools, they determined that renovation would not be feasible because of existing conditions. 101 of 111 elementary classrooms do not meet minimum standards of North Carolina State Depart-ment of Public Instruction.

The Committee recomm ed the supplemental tax levy to assist the Board of Education in recruiting and retaining capable teachers the schools. \$200 would still See SCHOOL BOND Page 8
