\$72,000 Project Started

A Davie County resident, who failed to obtain a high school diploma, may earn it at the Davie County Education Center.

That opportunity is one of many offered by the Center which began operation last June under a \$72,000 federal grant.

The grant was established under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act and it enables the Education Center to project imaginative solutions to educational problems.

The multi-phased project, conducted by the Center, offers adult education classes, remedial reading programs, student and adult art classes, educational movies for adults, discussion groups, public speaking classes, listening and viewing research area, curriculum materials display room and a kindergarten program.

Future courses may include classes in photography, creating writing, modern math for parents, speed reading, and some vocational classes depending upon the public's response to the courses.
