crashed into a bridge abuttment and rammed two rail sections through the car. Young was sit-ting in the middle of the car's front seat.

The accident occurred at the bridge on the Gladstone Road near the town limit.

When the car struck the wooden bridge railing, one rail

was driven though the right front of the vehicle, striking Young in the leg and back. Another railing was slammed through the car's windshield and struck Young in the head.

The driver of the vehicle was identified as Randall Wayne Jones, 17, of Rt. 4, Mocksville. He was not injured.
