### Burlington Sales Show Increase

Burlington Industries reported record consolidated net sales at \$391,716,000 for the quarter ended December 30, 1967, an increase of 16 per cent compared to sales of \$337,700,000 for the same period last year.

Net earnings for the quarter increased 24 per cent to \$20,032,000, equal to 79 cents per share on 25,322,000 shares outstanding at December 30. For the comparable quarter last year, net earnings were \$16,146,000 or 64 cents per share. Charles F. Myers, Jr., president, said the results were in

chartes F. Myers, Jr., president, said the results were in line with earlier expectations that textile demand was recovering from g e n e r a l l y depressed market conditions of last year. "We have experienced a marked increase in business since last September in most areas of operations," he stated, "and we expect the improvement to continue in our second fiscal quarter."

The Board of Directors of Burlington Industries, meeting in New York today, declared a regular quarterly dividend of 30 cents per share, payable March 1, 1968, to shareholders of record at the close of business February 2, 1968.


