for Burlington Industries, Inc., in its second fiscal quarter are running well ahead of the same period last year, said Charles F. Myens, Jr., president. Speaking at the annual meeting of shareholders, Mr. Myers said "sales since the first of January are about 16 per cent shead of this time last year, and our order backlog is also greater. We expect that sales and earnings in the present March quarter will be well in line with Docember quarter results." Outlining efforts to seek new

Outlining efforts to seek new usiness opportunities, he cited he expansion of Burlington perations abroad in market reas which are growing in size and purchasing power. He noted hat Burlington's offer to ac-uire a majority of the outstan-ing stock of Schappe A. G., company headquartered in lasle, Switzerland, "has been uccessful." Schappe plants are ocated in France, Germany, pain, Switzerland, Sweden and he United Kingdon, and nanufacture spun and tez-urized yarns, knit goods and ther textile products. "With these operations and ur other international plants,"

"With these operations and our other international plants," Mr. Myers stated, "we are in Mr. Myers stated, "we are in good position to expand sales abroad. Our international finan-cing subsidiary, Burlington International, Inc., has just completed the sale in Europe of a 50 million Swiss Franc (\$11.5 million) bond issue. These 5½ per cent bonds have a 15-year maturity and were sold at par to non-U.S. investors." Capital expenditures for plant modernization and expansion for

the past three years have total ed \$330 million, Mr. Myers said and will enable Burdington to d \$330 million, Mr. Myers suo, and will enable Burlington to mentit from the growing de-nand for textile products. At resent, he added, production acilities are operating at about 5 per cent of capacity, and the Company plans to spend an astimated \$125 million this year for further plant and equipment improvements.

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improvements. Reviewing the Company's performance in its first flocal quarter ended December 30, he noted that sales increased 16 per cent over the same quarter last year, reaching a record growter-ly high of \$302 million. Net Earnings increased 34 per cent to \$20 million or 79 cents per share.

share. Mr. Myers commented that "while there are many unknowns here and abroad which can affect the general economy in 1968, the outlook for textiles—and for Burlington in particular—appears to be good in the period immediately ahead."

The Burlington chief executive ointed out that fundamental de-nand factors for textiles during mand factors for textiles during the next three to five years in-dicate excellent growth poten-tial. These factors, he said, in-clude rapid increases in the young adult segment of the population, new h o u s e h o l d formations and a growth desire for better apparel and home furnishings.

furnishings. "In line with this outlook," Mr. Myers said, "we believe that research and development will play an increasingly im-portant role in our business. We are expanding our research staff and the scope of research in-vestigations."

A total of 12 drivers, a mix-ure of NASCAR and USAC


