A mini-take will be given to the lucky ticket holder. Tickets may be purchased from any Jaycee or at the gate. Admissions will be 25 cents for children and 50 cents for adults.

The concession stand will be open to serve hot dogs, potato chips, candy, sodas and soft drinks. Proceeds will go to the Jaycee community fund.

Vicki Makes A Hit As Miss Mocksville

Vicki Davis is back home after participating as Miss Mocksville in the Miss North Carolina Pageant in Charlotte last week, and from all reports, she made an excellent representative.

Ned Cline, commenting in The Salisbury Post, said that Vicki was the only girl receiving a double ovation from the crowd in Owens Auditorium after her talent presentation Tuesday night.

Vicki, who plans to major in art at East Carolina where she will be a junior this fall, did a modern dance and jazz twirl to the music of the Tijuana Brass. She didn't win the talent competition (take it from an ex-beauty pageant reporter, the opera singers and classical piano players always win that) but she did well.

"I guess the highlight of the trip," explains Vicki, "was getting through my talent without dropping the baton."

"But," she explained, "I really wasn't nervous like they said in the Salisbury Post. I enjoy performing in front of an audience, and look forward

to the talent part of the pageant most of all."

Vicki had had very little formal training in the baton but she was the chief majorette at Davis High in 1966. She also was Miss Merry Christmas.

She entered the Miss Mocksville Pageant last August after being approached by Jaycees Jim Andrews and Bill Foster. After winning, she went to Wingate Junior College where she finished this spring.

Vicki, a 20-year-old with blue eyes and a striking figure, is the daughter of Mrs. Bernard Foster and the late George W. Davis of Route 4, Mocksville. She went to Cooleemee School before going to Davis High.

While in Charlotte, she was chaperoned by Connie Andrews. "And I do mean chaperoned," said Vicki. "All the chaperones had to be with the girls all the time. If either of us wanted to leave the room (at the Coliseum Motel) for a Coke, we'd both have to go."

The home folk made a big hit with Vicki in Charlotte. She
