Jimmy Hellard Killed In Wreck At N. Cooleemee

James Gordon (Jimmy) Hellard, 26, of Watt Street, was killed after a wreck Thursday night on Highway 501 in North Cooleemee in front of Lee Olan Shepherd's house.

He lost control of the convertible he was driving and it skidded sideways into the path of an oncoming car.

The wreck was investigated by Patrolman R. L. Boone. Hellard, who was driving his boss' car, died Friday about 1 a.m. in Baptist Hospital.

Patrolman Boone said that Hellard was driving a 1956 Oldsmobile convertible west on N.C. 501 when he lost control of the vehicle in a curve.

The convertible began skidding sideways and ran through a ditch into an oncoming 1954 Buick driven by Garland Herman Knox of Winston-Salem.

Patrolman Boone said that Knox apparently observed the oncoming vehicle skidding toward him, and had almost stopped his car when the collision occurred about 8 p.m. Knox was not injured.

The convertible was demolished. Damage incurred to the Knox car was estimated at \$200 to the front and left side.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday at Eaton's Funeral Chapel by the Rev. E. M. James. Burial was in Rowan Memorial Park.

Born in Davis County August 9, 1932, he was the son of Glenn and Stella Trulove Hellard. He was a veteran.

Survivors, in addition to his parents, include two daughters, Stella Ann and Nadine Hellard of the home; one son, James Hellard of California; one brother, Donald Hellard of Cooleemee; two sisters, Mrs. Arnold Anderson of Mocksville and Miss Mickey Hellard of the home.
