N.C. Jaycee President To Speak At Installation

James W. Church, president of the North Carolina Jaycees, will be the guest speaker at the Cooleemee Jaycees Installation Banquet at Ketner's Cafeteria on Saturday.

A native of Sparta, currently residing in Clemmons, where he is Vice-President with Northwestern Bank, Church was elected in May, 1968, to direct the activities of more than 10,000 Tar Heel Jaycees.

Jim attended Sparta High School and William and Mary College. It was shortly after graduation from Sparta High School that he married the

former Joe Ann Pearson. They now have two sons, Jimmy and John.

As a Jaycee, Church has served as charter President, Chairman of the Board and Vice President of the Clemmons club. His former state activities include a state chairmanship, and services as Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Administrative Nat'l Director.

Jim's civic interests have spread beyond the Jaycees, and he continues to be active in other community affairs in Clemmons. Some of his other civic interests include serving

as Elect Stewart in Clemmons Methodist Church, Clemmons Civic Club, Charter Treasurer of the Southwest Forsyth Little League, member of the Board of Directors for the local Volunteer Fire Department, member of the Clemmons Lion Club, Clemmons Library Board, member of the Forsyth County School Study Committee and the Forsyth County 4-H Club Council.

He has been named recipient of many awards during his Jaycee career, the highest being in 1965, when he was selected Clemmons' Outstanding Young Man.

Sign Children Up For Kindergarten Summer Program

Applications for the 1969-70 kindergarten programs for eligible children in Davie County are now being considered.

Sponsored under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, priority is given to children of economically deprived backgrounds.

A morning and afternoon session will be held at the Mocksville Elementary School at the Education center here. Morning classes will begin at 8:30 and dismiss at 11 a.m. Afternoon classes will be held from 12:30 to 3 p.m.

Transportation to the classes is the responsibility of the parents of the children. Eligible children from any area of the county may attend.

In the event a sufficient number of children from economically deprived homes do not apply, the remaining applicants will be selected on the basis of economic priority.

Application forms for the kindergarten program may be obtained from the Board of Education Office, the Mocksville Elementary School, or the Education Center.

Tutoring Children

Cooleemee Girl Helps In Pfeiffer Program

MISENHEIMER, Sharing in a Pfeiffer College student sponsored and directed tutorial program for 130 area elementary school children is Miss Elizabeth Sexton, Cooleemee.

A project of the Pfeiffer College Student Chapter of the National Education Association, 40 Pfeiffer students have worked in the program. The area youngsters are brought to the Pfeiffer campus on Wednesday nights for the tutorial sessions.

Student director is Joe Internicola, an upperclassman from Elmont, Long Island, who has as his co-directors Mike Africa, Atlanta, Fla., and Sandra Allen, Gastonia.

Two 45 minute sessions are held, the first session being devoted to reading skills. During the second session, the young students may work in an area such as language arts, the natural sciences, mathematics or social studies.

The program, which began in March, will end April 30. Faculty advisor to the group is Bill Tyson of the college's education faculty. The Pfeiffer Student Government Association has given the program financial support.

Mr. Tyson commented "this has been a tremendous learning and growing experience for both groups. The contact of our college students with three or four children in a highly personal situation has been most valuable. Their enthusiasm con-

firms the fact that Pfeiffer students are eager and ready to work in community service projects."

Miss Sexton is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Sexton, 36 Center St., Cooleemee and is a graduate of Davie County High School, Mocksville.
