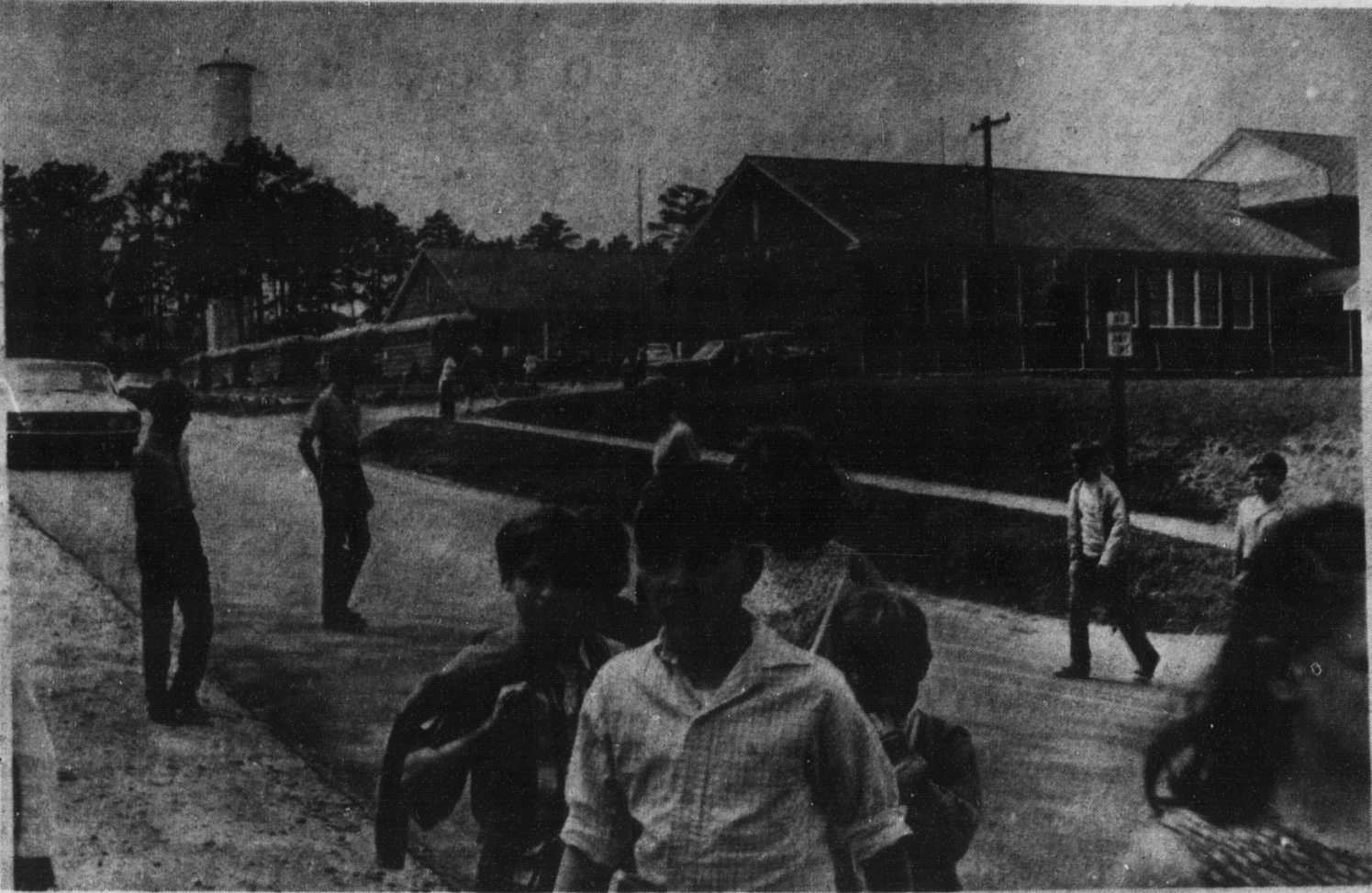

This week he was informed that the owners of Deluxe Vacationer Company of Hollywood, Calif., sponsors of the contest, had been arrested in Los Angeles and charged with mail fraud. Thus, no trip. The owners, according to the Better Business

Bureau, ran the contest and picked a large number of entrants as "winners." They had to send \$25 as a registration deposit for the 10-day stay in a luxury hotel in order to get the round trip ticket. Foster sent in his \$25 check, but cancelled it when he heard about the fraud involved. Harold's not so worried about the \$25 though. What's got him in hot water is that he promised his wife Mary the trip to Hawaii. Will he or won't he have to cough up two round trip tickets and a 10-day stay in Hawaii? He's weighing the consequences — both ways.
