Two More File For Town Board

Two additional candidates filed as candidates for the town council before Thursday's deadline. They are William Gales of Ruffin Street and Jerry Bailey of Marginal Street

The voters may have a choice of voting for five candidates from the eleven who have filed to run.

Dr. Ramey Kemp, chairman of the Davie County Board of Elections, said Monday after-noon that there will be two ballots in this special election. Those voters who favor the incorporation of the Town of Cooleemee shall vote a ballot upon which shall be printed the words: "FOR incorporation of Town of Cooleemee," and those voters who are opposed to the incorporation of Town of Cooleemee shall retain the little of the contract eemee shall vote a ballot upon which shall be printed the words: "AGAINST Incorporation of Town of Cool-eemee."

Also in the special election each qualified voter shall be entitled to vote for five (5) candidates for Town Council upon a ballot on which shall be listed, in alphabetical order, the names of all persons who filed notice of candidacy with the Board of Elections during the period previously designated.

Unlike a general election, Dr. Kemp pointed out that in a special election such as this, the voter "shall be entitled to vote for five candidates" but the rules do not say that the ballot will be void if the voter fails to vote for as many as five. They may vote for any number candidates up to five, which is the number of vacancies to be

However, Dr. Kemp did say that to vote for more than five candidates would void the bal-

In the special election, if the majority votes for in-corporation, the three (3) candidates for the council who re-ceive the largest number of votes shall be declared elected for terms of four years or until their successors are elected and qualified, and the two (2) candidates for town council who receive the next largest number of votes cast shall be declared elected for terms of two (2) years or until their successors are elected and qualified. In case of a tie between opposing candidates, the Board of Elec-tions shall determine the result

Dr. Kemp also said that if the town should become incorporated, the future elections would require the voter to mark their ballot for as many candidates as there are offices to fill.
