American People Rank as the Least Thrifty of the Nations of the Earth.

Americans are the least thrifty of all nations. We rank below even Japan and Italy in this respect. In Switzerland there are 544 depositors in savings banks for every 1,000 of population. In America only 99 depositors for each 1,000 of population.

Commenting on this fact the Nauticus Magazine says:

Life has grown more and more complex at a bewildering pace in America. The more we have gained in our conquest of material things the more we have wanted. We have not been content with simple living well within our means. We have constantly reached out to make a showing equal to our more wealthy neighbors. This has become almost a mania among Americans of all classes. And having succeeded in raising our standard of living, by strenuous and unremitting effort to get ahead, we have not found ourselves any happier or healthier or more useful to ourselves or others.

What we need is to popularize simpler standards of living. We ought to make it the custom, make it fashionable, for each family to live within its means.

A man who earns \$10,000 a year and spends more is no better off at the end of the year, and no happier, than the man who earns but \$3,000 a year.

It is our ideals, our purposes and our standards of living that play the great part in making us really happy and successful, or the reverse.
