MRS. W. L. JOHNSON DIES IN HOSPITAL OF TYPHOID

Had Been Ill Five Weeks—Was Buried Near Falkland Thursday P. M. Nov. 25th.

In the death of Mrs. Walter L. Johnson we are forcibly reminded of the words "in the midst of life we are in death."

She was the only child of Elias and Ida Harris, and granddaughter of the late Henry Harris, and was only twenty-four years of age.

After an illness of five weeks of typhoid fever in Spicer's Sanitarium in Goldsboro, the silver chords of life were loosened and the beautiful spirit of "Annie Bess" took its flight—in the dawn of the morning of November 24th.

She possessed many lovable traits of the lofiest type of womanhood and her cheerful

laughter will ever linger in the memory of those who loved her. She leaves a husband and one little son, a mother, one sister and brother to mourn their loss; to whom we extend our heartfelt sympathy.

The funeral was held at the Emanuel Episcopal church in Farmville Thursday afternoon at one o'clock by her pastor, Rev. John Mathews.
