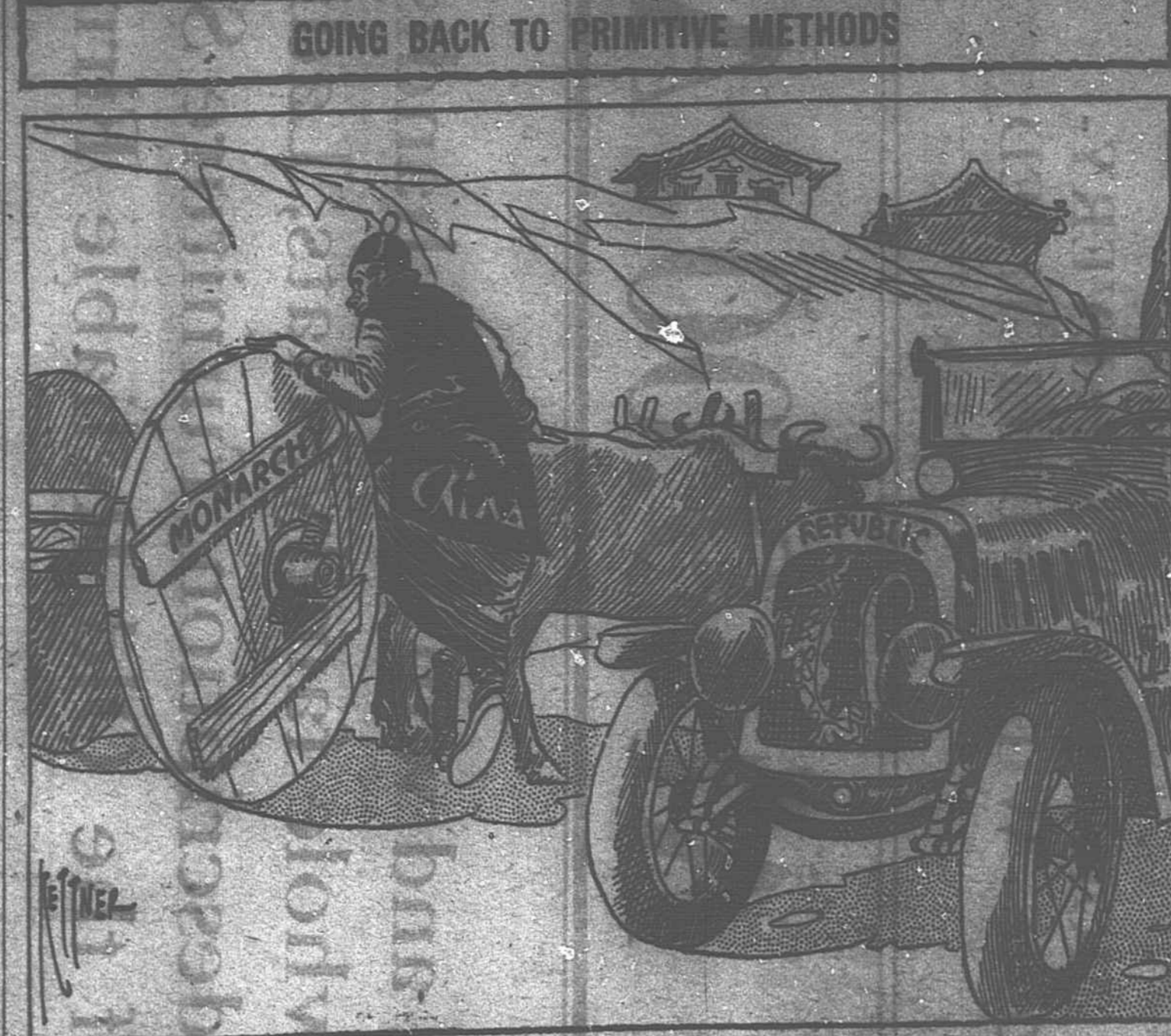

## FARMVILLE TOBACCO MARKET MAKES GOOD RECORD IN NOV.

Sold 1,748,500 Pounds for \$288,136.86, an average of \$16.46.

Mr. G. A. Jones, president of the Farmville Tobacco Board of Trade, informs us that for the month of November the market sold in round numbers 1,748,500 pounds at an average of \$16.46, bringing a total of \$288,136.86. The above average shows that the Farmville market in comparison with other nearby markets, is again the leader by from one to two dollars per hundred.
