DEATH OF MRS. ALLIE NEWTON

On Sunday Jan. 6th, 1916, in the quiet stillness of the midnight hour, when all nature was clothed in darkness, and when most of the people of Fountain were enjoying their slumbers, the Death Angel in his rapid flight quietly entered the home of Mrs. R. A. Fountain, and claimed for his victim the sweet spirit of her devoted mother, Mrs. Allie Newton. Mrs. Newton was born on March 13, 1841 near Falkland, N. C. In early womanhood she was happily married to Col. Walter Newton, who preceded her to the spirit-land many years ago, leaving with her three children, who now survive her. When only a little girl, she was converted and joined old Antioch Christian church at Farmville, and ever afterwards lived a consistent member of the same.

Her remains were laid to rest in the family grave-yard near Falkland, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. J. I. Walker, of Greenville.

This snatching of heart strings, this flight of years, this tread of feet, reminds us that we too are passing. The parting is not for long, for soon we shall all anchor in the Haven of Rest, and be with those we love. So grieve not fond children, for mother has gone on before, and is waiting and watching for her children.
