## Wilson's Election Now Assured Has 269 Electoral Votes Certain

Nation-wide Suspense and Anxiety Finally Ended Says the Morning  
Dilemma—California, Which Since the Election Has Hung in Pivot,  
Dropped into the Democratic Column Thursday Night, Giving  
Wilson Three Votes More than Necessary to Elect, with  
Four States Yet in the Doubtful Column. President  
Notified of His Election—A Great Victory Won.

### DEMOCRATS LEAD STATE BY 52,000 MAJORITY.

Democratic Majority Greatest Since 1900 When Aycock Swept the State—Pitt County  
Elects All Democratic Nominees by An Overwhelming Large Majority.

#### As The News in Brief Arrived.

Tuesday night indications first pointed to the election of Mr. Hughes, but before the night had passed it was seen that the contest was close, and that President Wilson's vote was increasing at a rate sufficient to cause all Democracy to rejoice.

Thursday continued uncertain, due to the fact that complete returns from all the States had not been received, but at this writing there is an assurance of Wilson having at least 269 electoral votes, which gives him a plurality of 3—with 27 votes yet doubtful.

Up to a late hour the news showed that the Wilson electoral vote stood at 269, the Hughes vote at 235, and the result in California, Minnesota, and both States of Wisconsin is in the lead. In California Hughes overcame Wilson, while in Minnesota and Wisconsin he had fallen back, but Wilson's lead in the contest was still the figure.

Later in the afternoon the figures indicated that North Dakota would have to be taken out of Wilson column, reducing his vote to 251 and carrying Hughes to 243. Upon this basis it was figured that either the twelve votes of Minnesota or the thirteen votes of California, with the three votes of New Mexico, in which State the President is leading, would win for him, as that would be either 266 or 267.

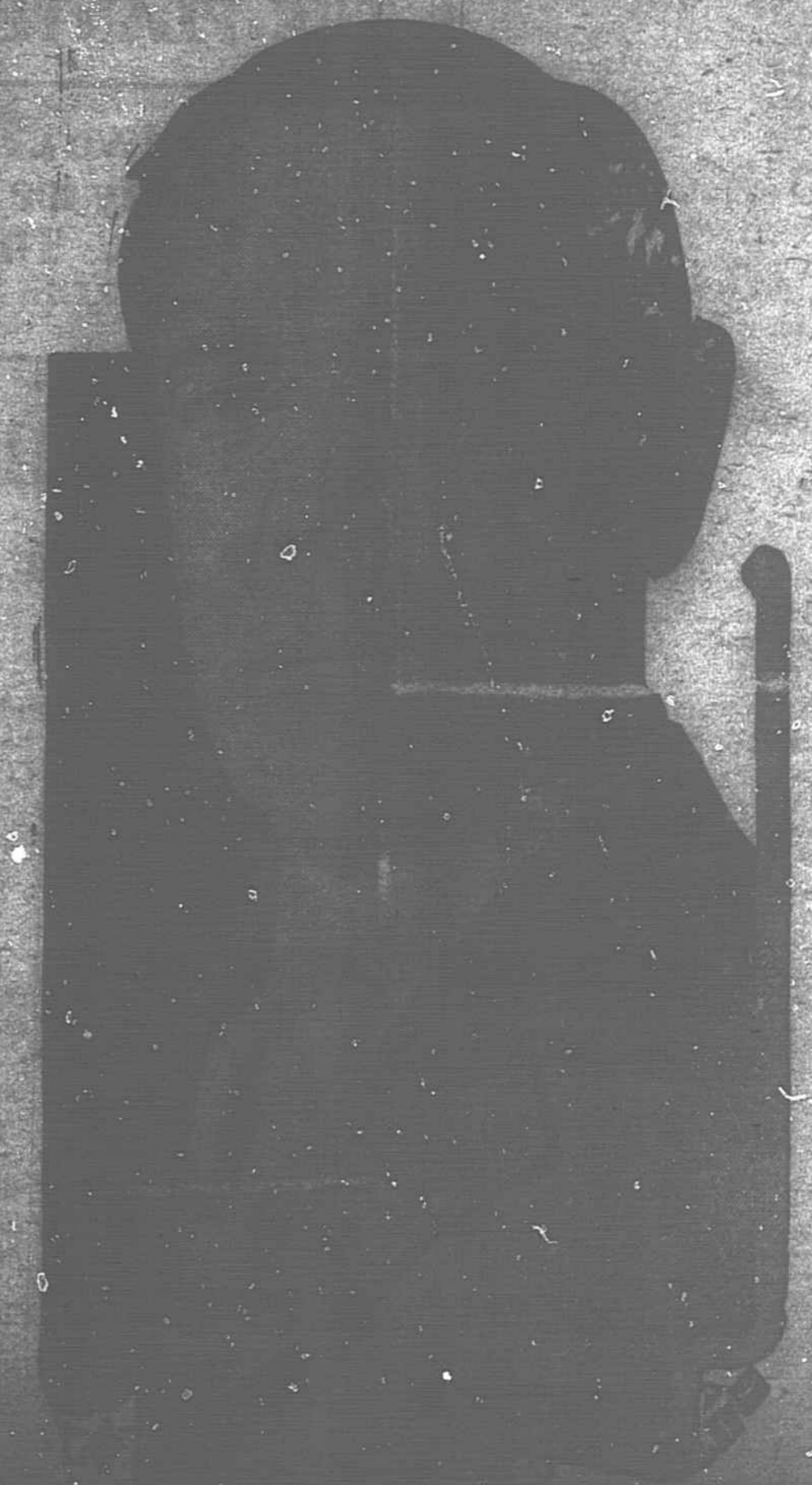

Several Matters of Great Importance to the Farmville

A special called meeting of the Farmville Community Chamber of Commerce was held in the Town Hall Wednesday night, at which time several matters of vital interest to the town and community were taken up. The committee appointed to look into the matter of securing a down town telegraph office made a very favorable report, though nothing definite has so far been done by either of the telegraph companies. However, everything points to the securing of this convenience.

Another matter presented to the Chamber, and one which attracted much interest was that of securing for Farmville a large tobacco drying plant and stemmer. The Chamber went on record as favoring this proposition, and a committee of five were appointed to meet with the Board of Town Commissioners in special session today (Thursday) in the interest of securing this industry.
