MARKET CLOSED ON WEDNESDAY WITH BIG GAINS

Farmville Tobacco Market Sold Some Over Seven and a Half Million During Season. Only Market in East Making a Gain. With Erection of Two Large Plants and Normal Crop, The Market expects to Sell Ten or Twelve Million Next Season.
