Although these teachers are leaving for a vacation it is with pleasure we learn that they will all return to resume their duties in the Farmville Graded and High Schools next September.

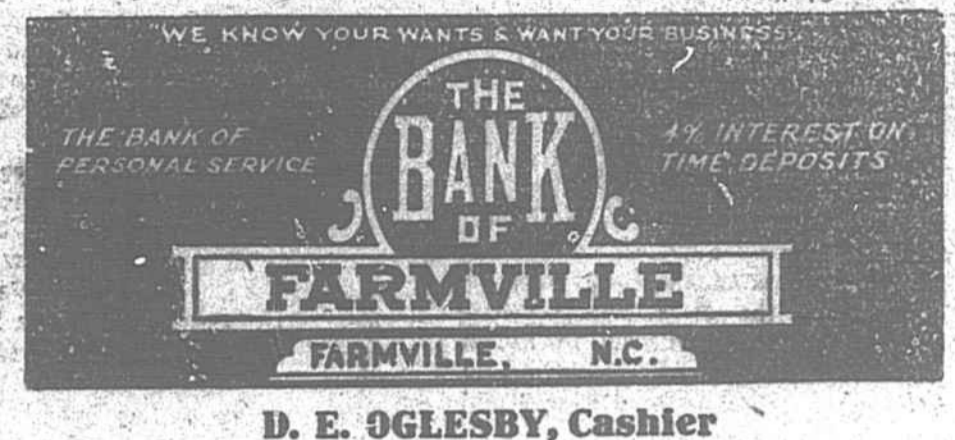
