

HEARING ON PHONE MATTER POSTPONED

BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY IS PETITIONING FOR A RAISE OF TWENTY PER CENT.

AUDIT OF BOOKS CALLED FOR

It is understood that no further request for a postponement will be made or entertained if made.

Continuance of the hearing before the State Corporation Commission on the Bell Telephone Company's petition for an increase of 20 per cent in its telephone rates throughout North Carolina was allowed by the commission upon a motion made by T. T. Cantler, of Charlotte, counsel for the company, and commercial and civic organizations opposing the increase.

With the request was coupled another, calling for an audit of the telephone company's books, and to be done by an expert named and employed by the commission, and the expense to be borne by the company. The date of the hearing was fixed for January 27.

Following two hours of argument between Mr. Cantler and James H. Poe, of Raleigh, and Hunt Chappoy of Atlanta, who spoke for the telephone company, an agreement was reached which was summarized as follows: "No further request for postponement will be made, it being understood that the question must be settled on January 27th and what increase, if any, that is granted will be retroactive to January 1, 1921."

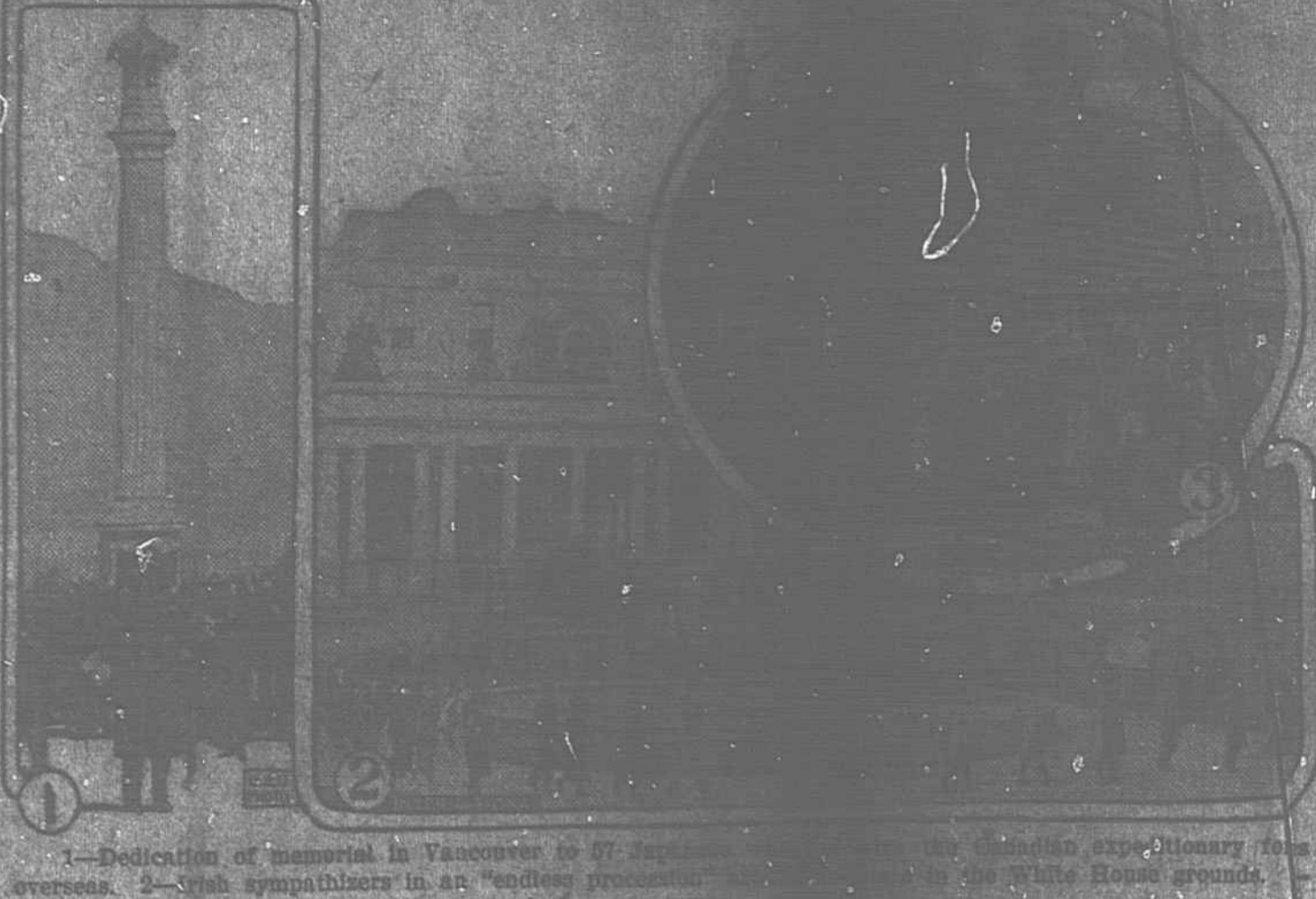
