Commencement Exercises At Odd Fellows Orphan Home. Concert Classes Start on Annual Tours.

Goldboro, N. C., June 2.—With the graduation exercises last night, the commencement at the Odd Fellows Orphan Home School, came to a successful conclusion. The graduating class this year was composed of five girls: Misses Mabel Irene Allbrook, Myrtle Wilber Biggs, Inez Marietta Dalton, Mamie Ruth Bell, Pattie Almyra Mumford. Martha Westmoreland was a member of the class, but was taken sick in the spring and had to drop out of the class. These young ladies acquitted themselves very creditably, Miss Myrtle Biggs was the valedictorian of the class, and received the A. M. Shrago medal for the highest general average for her senior year. Miss Iva Jenkins received the Joseph N. Jacobi medal for the best all round record in the school and in the performance of her Home duties.

The literary address was delivered by Hon. Dennis G. Brummitt, Ex-Speaker of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of North Carolina. The address by Mr. Brummitt was both interesting and instructive and was full of food for thought, not only for the young people of the institution, but for the older people who were present. He dealt with our present day problems, and his address was in keeping with the motto of the graduating class: "Be Somebody for Somebody."

The medals were presented by Hon. W. F. Evans, Past Grand Master, who was himself a former Ward of the Orphan Home. The Alumni Association held its annual meeting Wednesday afternoon, at which time they raised about \$1,500.00 in cash and pledges for the Endowment Fund of the Orphan Home.

Grand Master L. W. Moore, of Wilmington, presented a handsome bible to each member of the graduating class on behalf of the Past Presidents of the Rebekah State Assembly. The diplomas were presented by Marcus W. Jacobi, Chairman of the Board of Trustees. In connection with the commencement exercises, the Orphan Home High School pupils presented a play on Tuesday night, entitled, "The Arizona Cowboy," which was pronounced the best entertainment seen in Goldboro for twenty-five years. The commencement sermon was preached on Sunday night by Rev. J. W. Potter, pastor of the Methodist Church. The Concert classes left Goldboro today for their annual tours, one covering western North Carolina and the other the east.
