During the month of October and November the home will have 70 boys between 5 months and 14 years for placement. There are girls on the list too. Pitt county must have a number of Christian homes where children are wanted. Note the conditions: A Christian home where the child would have an opportunity to attend church; a good school which the child must attend; discipline and training which a good home gives. We want the child to become member of the family and if desired later adopted into the family.
