



CAR, WHISKEY AND DEALERS CAPTURED IN FISTLE FIGHT

Sheriff Dudley Makes Big Head as Result of Fight Over 20 Gallons of Whiskey

Greenville Dec. 19.—An Essex automobile, about 20 gallons of contraband whiskey and Will Kenyon colored man of the Greenville district, are being held at the county jail in this city today as result of activities of Sheriff Dudley following a gun fight among members of the illicit traffic between one and two o'clock Sunday morning. Henry McLawhorn and Ed Bright, white men residing a few miles from Greenville, are also under indictment for connection in the affair, while Will Peyton, another colored man, is suffering from wounds received in the gun fight, which occurred as result of a long chase of circumstances before the sheriff arrived.

Will Kenyon started out to wards Farmville with twenty gallons of whiskey in an Essex automobile Saturday night. The car broke down a few miles from Greenville, and Kenyon "tanked up" from his large stock of beverages and proceeded to take Christmas in advance of the holiday season. After consuming an amount of the brew they beverages he went to the home of Henry Willoughby, a short distance from where the car broke down, toward Willoughby.

Henry drew his gun and began firing upon the intruder, and in the heat of the moment a fight broke out in progress. Kenyon's car was in a condition of complete disrepair and was unable to move.

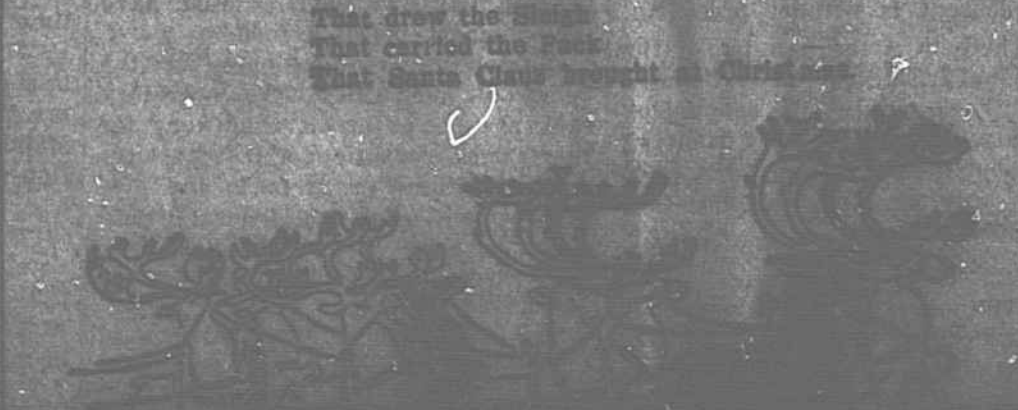

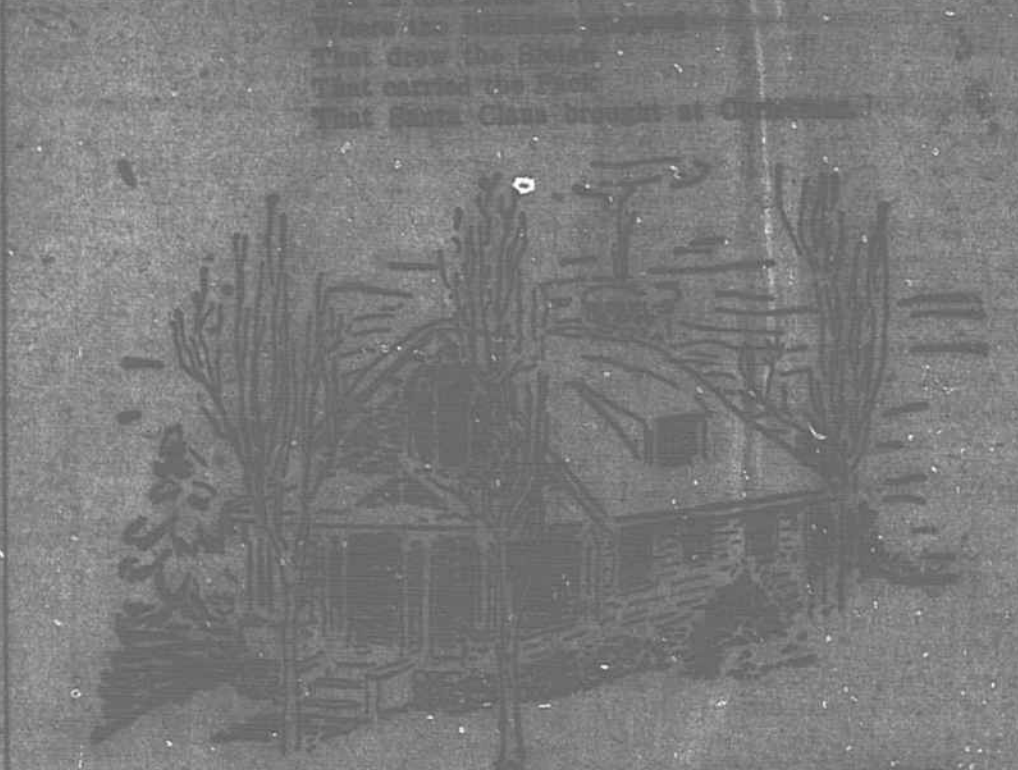

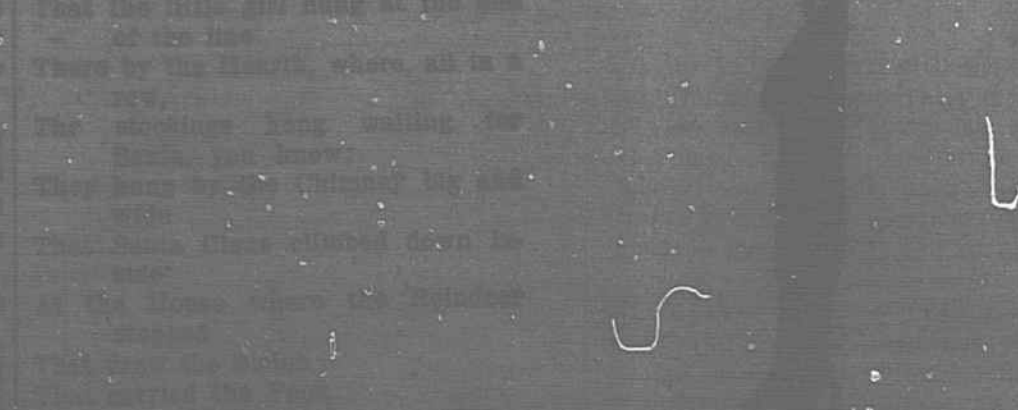
