## A QUESTION-- WHAT IS MUSCLE SHOALS

Much Talk and Interest Being Shown Concerning This Important Place Owned By Uncle Sam.

Why so much talk about Muscle Shoals? What is it? Where is it? Questions of this type are frequently heard, and it is doubtful if many persons have an accurate conception of the importance of this project.

Muscle Shoals is a series of rapids or shoals in the Tennessee River near Florence, Alabama.

The shoals extend a distance of 37 miles, and the fall in that distance is 104 feet.

The width between banks varies from 1000 to 3600 feet. The current is very rapid, the slope is as great as 15 per cent in certain places.

The U. S. Government constructed a nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals during the War. The plant was operated with coal on an experimental basis. It required 1500 tons of coal per day to run the plant.
