CIVIL SESSION OF SUPERIOR COURT OPENS HERE TODAY

Today to Be Spent in Examination of the Entire Civil Docket as Ordered by Judge

MANY UNIMPORTANT ACTIONS TO BE HEARD DURING THIS WEEK

It is Expected Work Will Continue With Only Slight Interruption Each Day

The regular February term of the county superior court for the trial of civil cases convened in this city today with Judge E. B. Cranmer of Siler City presiding. The docket, as usual, is congested beyond hope of being within the next several months of the calendar contains only twenty cases which will probably be disposed of during the present term.

Today will be consumed by an examination of the entire civil docket and it is probable this will result in the clearing off of numbers of actions which have been hanging from term to term several months. The call of all cases was ordered by Judge Cranmer with hope of relieving the congestion as much as possible.

No important actions are listed in the calendar for the present week and it is expected work will continue with only ordinary interruptions from time to time.

The road was the first to be ruined by one short piece of bad land, and it was imperative to proceed to make the entire system complete. Pitt county within the next few years will have one of the best highway systems in the country, and the people should be proud of it because they haven't been forced to "put out" very much in the way of expense. We provided five hundred thousand dollars for the purpose and the state and government did the rest.

In Answer to Your Public Protection

Are they protecting the health of the Citizens which is more important than any other protection they could have. Who we need most of all is a good combination Health and Plumber inspector. One who can make the town safe to live in. We have a health reporter to come to our schools and examine the children. Why not have a health officer to come to our homes and examine our plumbing, and back yards? This will make the children more fit for school, and the business men more fit for business. For it will protect their lives from deadly poisons which is escaping from non-sanitary plumbing.

Some people think that so a pipe carries off the refuse from a fixture it is alright and plumbing is plumbing, that so water comes and goes. But they are wrong. They have got to learn and wake up to the danger in shoddy plumbing, when not properly installed, for leaky pipes bring on diseases, diseases bring on death. Look at the water lost by leaky pipes. Who loses this water—the town, and the Citizens look because the town is still in debt, she never will get out at this rate as long as you let your water run all night to keep it from freezing. There is enough water wasted in leaks without letting it run all night. You ask them why they don't cut their water off, the reply is if I do I can't get any next day. This is an account of non sanitary work, and the town bears the burden. Look at the waste water running under some houses from sinks and tubs just for the need of repairing.

Which is the cheapest, to pay a doctor and be sick or pay a plumber to make the proper changes? Am I right or wrong? I leave it to the citizens who need health.

BLAME FOR WRECK OF ROMA SHIFTED TO SHIP'S PILOTS

Inability of Pilots to Make Controls Function Result in Death of 34 Persons

THREE CONCURRENT INVESTIGATIONS TO BE CONDUCTED SOON

Ghost Dirigible Comes in Contact With Electric Wires on Descent, Catching Fire

Norfolk, Feb. 22.—Preliminary investigation of the fatal disaster shows that it was due to faulty control. General Mason Patrick, chief of air service, testified in this fact on the stand this afternoon.

Langley Field, Feb. 22.—Blame for wreck of the Omar has been placed on failure of controls to function, according to an official army explanation by Lieut. Colonel Fisher, acting commander of the air base. Inability of the pilots to prevent the descent also was cause of destruction of the giant dirigible.

A searching investigation will be made immediately from Washington, according to Washington dispatches received here today. Three concurrent investigations are being pushed by army officers, Major Kennedy, immediately after officers announced.

Thirty four persons were killed when the giant dirigible plunged from an altitude of one thousand feet to earth at Hampton Roads yesterday afternoon. There were forty odd persons aboard the ship, and it is considered short of a miracle how they escaped death. The giant ship came in contact with electric wires in its rapid flight to earth, caught fire and was destroyed in short order.
