### STAGE STARS TO FACE SALARY CUT

New York, Aug. 13.—With the consent of the Equity Association, actors face a big cut soon in the large salaries they have been receiving. Last season various producers let it be understood that they would like such a step, but each seemed waiting for the other to begin, and salaries remained just as high. Now A. H. Woods has led the way in asking the players he is engaging for his fall productions to take a cut, and indications were today that other managers would offer decreased pay next season. The cut may run as high as 50 per cent.

Woods adopted the unusual expedient of making an appeal to the general body of players, through the Actors' Equity Association, to accept a reduction. His plea ran in part as follows:

"I have brought back about thirty plays from Europe. I should like to do a great many of them, which would be of advantage to Equity as well as to me, but I can't do many of them if the fantastic salaries now prevailing continue to prevail.

### QUAKERS TO HOLD BIG CONVENTION AT RICHMOND, IND.

Hundreds of Delegates Will Attend Sessions at Richmond, Ind.

Richmond, Ind., Aug. 13.—Quakers from all parts of the United States and England will have Richmond as their goal this summer and fall. For great gatherings of Friends, two of which are held here annually, one of which is held but once each five years and the other but once each four years, will be the cynosure of all eyes of Quakerdom this year.

Greatest of all sessions will be that of the Five Years Meeting of Friends in America, the governing body of those of the orthodox faith, which will be held from September 5 to September 12. Each of the thirteen yearly meetings in America and Canada is permitted to send six official delegates, regardless of the membership of the meeting. One delegate for each 2,000 members over a given quota is also allowed.

Information from officials of the Five Years Meeting, whose offices are here, indicate that between 500 and 600 Friends will be present for this parent conference. Besides the most prominent members of the denomination in America, John Henry Barlow, former clerk of London Yearly Meeting and presiding clerk at the All Friends Conference held in London in 1920, will be present for an address. He will be accompanied by his wife.

Roundtree Ghitt, head of Friends social work in London, is another prominent English Quaker to be present, as will also Barlow Cadbury, well known among Friends in America and England.

Some of the American Friends to be on the programme included Frederick J. Libby, executive secretary of the National Council for Redaction of Altruism, Washington, D. C.; Robert Russell, head of the Woolman School, Philadelphia; and Rufus Jones, professor of philosophy at Hartford College, Philadelphia.
