**Congress to Back

Washington, Aug. 10.—President Harding will have the backing of congress if it is necessary to seize the railroads to prevent the transportation of fuel, food and other necessities. There seems to be a general backing down of the judgment of Senate leaders of both parties, it was said today.

**COAL PRICES INCREASE
IN STATE OF TENNESSEE**

Knoxville, Aug. 10.—The price of coal in the state has increased to \$4 a ton and half above the Hoover law price of three fifty a ton, according to one contractor here. This is due to the fact that a scale of two fifty a ton increase is being demanded by the Southern Appalachian Coal Operators' association and affects a hundred mines and eight thousand miners.
