DAIRY CAMPAIGN FOR PITT COMES TO CLOSE.

Mr. A. Kimrey, of State College Gives Several Reasons For Drinking Pure Milk.

The dairy campaign, under the auspices of the county Demonstration Agent and the Pitt County Chamber of Commerce, came to a close at Gamesland last night.

Mr. A. C. Kimrey, Assistant Dairy Hurdsevan at the State College at Raleigh, was at all of the meetings and was the principal speaker. His observation, study and experience, coupled with his enthusiasm, make him an intensely interesting speaker.

Summarizing, we have the following:

"Milk is the only balanced food in the human diet."

"Every child under fifteen years of age should have one quart each day."

"Were it not for milk in some form, every child would die soon after birth—within ten days."

"One quart of normal whole milk contains as much food value as four fifths of a pound of ham."

"The disease of rickets, common to children, is caused by a lack of wholesome milk."

"Boys and girls who are not getting milk will not develop mentally as they should, to say nothing of the physical development."

"The door to future success is securely locked, in the majority of cases, to the boy and girl who are growing up without milk."

There are more centenarians in Bulgaria than in any other country in the world. Also there is more milk consumed per capita in Bulgaria than in any other country in the world.

"The United States census shows that the per capita consumption of milk in the Union is one pint per day, while the South is consuming less than one third of a pint per day."

"The three important classes of foods are: Milk, eggs and leafy vegetables."

"Dr. McCollum of Johns Hopkins University says: 'The people who have achieved, who have become large, strong, vigorous people, who have reduced their infant mortality, who have the best trades in the world, who have an appreciation of art, literature and music, and who are progressing in science, and in every activity of the human intellect, are the people who have used milk and its products liberally.'"

"Every cow should have two acres of good pasture for sum-

mer grazing."

"Plenty of clean, fresh water should be available at all times for the cow."

"Without proper care, a cow cannot produce normal milk."

"Confer with your county agent as to suitable grasses for a good pasture."
