Dr. P. E. Jones was on the program for a lecture at this time but was unavoidably detained.

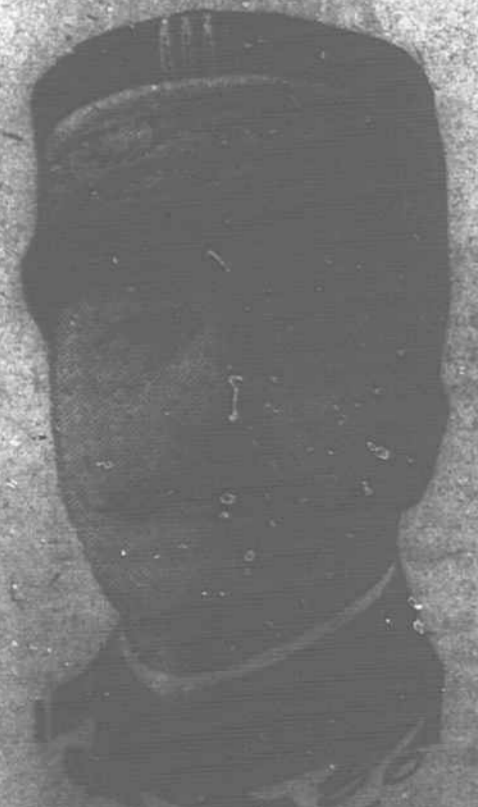
Changing the time of meeting from 7:30 to 8:00 o'clock the association adjourned.

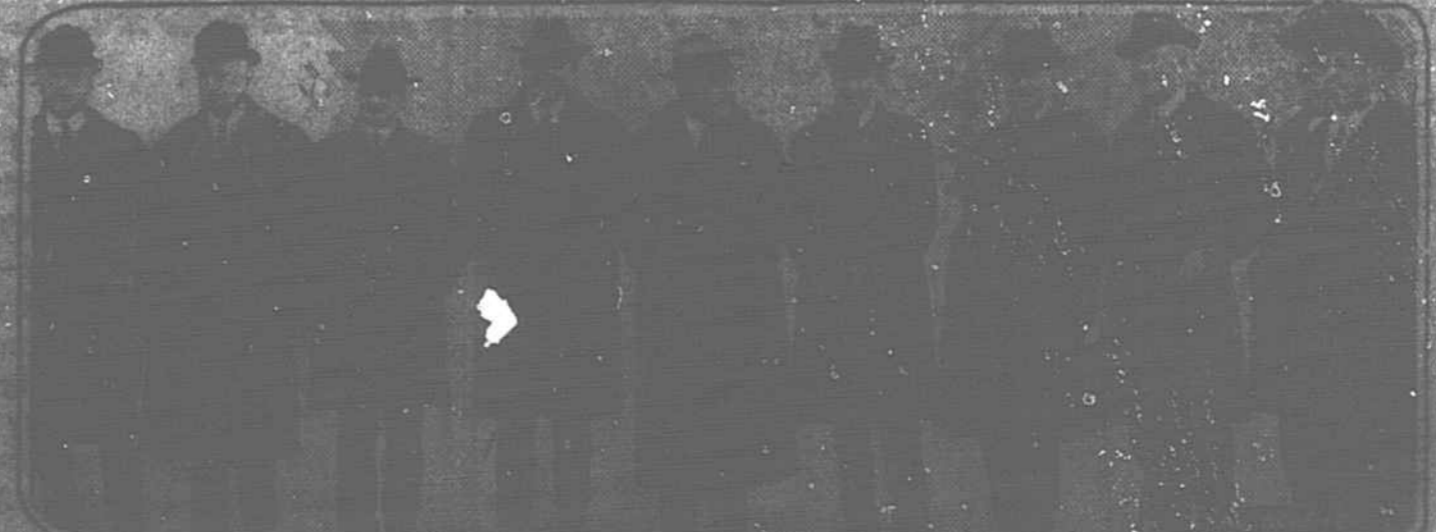
