The Books for the Registration of voters for the Primary will be opened March 15th and closed on April 7th. All persons not registered in the Primary held two years ago for the Town Election are required to register during said time in order to vote in said Primary.

The Primary will be held on Tuesday, April 17th. In the event of a second Primary this will be held ten days after the first, which date has been set for the 27th of April, 1923.

All candidates for offices are required to file their notice of candidacy on or before April 3rd, 1923.

The fee for each candidate for Mayor is \$5.00 and should be deposited with the Democratic Executive Committee upon the filing of the notice of candidate.

The fee for each candidate for Commissioner is \$1.00 and should be deposited with the Democratic Executive Committee upon the filing of the notice of candidate.

The Democratic Executive Committee consists of J. W. Holmes, J. R. Davis and J. T. Thorne.

The Books for Registration for the general Town Election will be open on April 4th, 1923, and close on April 28th, 1923.

## Tobacco Farmers!

At a recent meeting of the Farmville Tobacco Board of Trade, it was decided to exert their fullest efforts in the campaign that is being waged against the tobacco bug or beetle by the tobacco interests generally throughout Eastern Carolina.

The beetle has become such an alarming pest to the tobacco industry that it is comparable to the boll weevil menace to cotton, in the damage they do, and it is of mutual interest to the farmers, warehousemen and buyers to take immediate steps to combat the evil.

All factories and warehouses in Eastern Carolina are now conducting a thorough clean-up campaign of their buildings and the farmers are also hereby requested to take similar action in cleaning up their barns, packhouses, etc. These insects breed from accumulations of trash tobacco, dust, etc., in the corners, crevices and cracks of any place where tobacco has been handled, but once they become active they will leave the common tobacco to feast on the very best grades available, as they seem to be good judges of quality.

As tobacco infested with bugs or borers, which is the worm stage of the insect, is greatly depreciated in value, it is therefore to the farmer's interest to protect himself by helping to eliminate these pests, since they are present in greater numbers than has ever been known before.

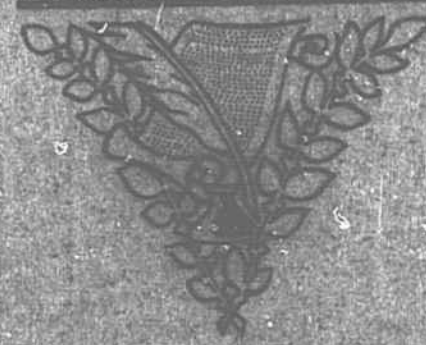
