DISTRICT MEETING OF  
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY  
HELD IN GREENVILLE

Farmville Delegates Had Place on Program and Gave History of Local Episcopal Church.

A District meeting of the Woman's Auxiliaries of the Episcopal church was held in St. Paul's church, Greenville, on Tuesday of this week with about sixty members present. The district is composed of the following towns; Greenville, Farmville, Ayden, Grifton and Winterville, and representatives were present from each with the exception of Grifton. Rev. James E. W. Cook, rector of St. Paul's gave a cordial welcome to the group and to several visitors from neighboring towns who were present.

Among the visitors was Rev. Walter R. Noe of Wilmington, executive secretary of the Diocese of Eastern Carolina, who addressed the assembly.

Mrs. C. S. Rountree presented one of Farmville's problems for discussion and Mrs. W. C. Askew gave a history of Emmanuel church of this city. Mrs. Rountree, in behalf of the visitors, thanked Greenville for its cordial welcome and hospitality.

Plans were laid for the July meeting to be held at Hill Crest and to which husbands of the members will be invited. Committees were appointed at this time by the president, Mrs. J. T. Cox, of Winterville.

For the benefit of those who were not present at the District meeting and of friends interested in the local Episcopal church its history as related by Mrs. Askew is printed below.

History of Emmanuel Church.  
In the early fifties, Rev. Angelo Benton, at that time rector of the Episcopal church at Wilson, came to Marlborough and held services in the old Academy—since destroyed. Mr. Benton was most earnest about his work—it is known that on several occasions, when there was no team available, he walked fourteen miles to hold a morning service. At that time Bishop Atkinson came once a year.

Rev. Israel Harding succeeded Mr. Benton. After having services in school houses, halls, shops and anywhere he could for several years the vision of a church at Farmville came to him. He called together his members, who were few and scattered far and wide, and implored them to make the building of this church their life work. They assented to this with many misgivings for it seemed almost impossible. However, a lot was donated on what is now Walnut street, in the heart of town, by Mrs. Louisa Hill and members began to have the building material placed thereon. Soon after this Mr. Harding died.

Bishop Watson was with us then and took up the work begun by the faithful Hardings, Joyner, Morrills, Hargraves, Smiths, Mewhorns, Shepards, Mays, Bynums and others.

The first Emmanuel church begun in 1888, was a modest wooden building, but a monument to the work, love and sacrifice of its few members.

It would be impossible to give a history of this church without paying a tribute to the loving faithful service of Mrs. John S. Smith, a pioneer church-woman, who came to Farmville from Tarboro, a bride, in 1913, and organized the first Sunday school, when the children had to climb over the lumber to reach their seats. She was superintendent of the Sunday school for several years, organizer and president of the Auxiliary for twelve years that she spent at Farmville.

Rev. Edward Watson was the first rector of this church and the following clergymen have served since: Philip S. B. Taylor, Wm. E. Cox, Norris C. Dunson, Boston A. Leakey, Dallas Tucker, J. K. Matthews, Paul J. E. Grubbs, B. F. Hargrave, Howard Allgood. These clergymen had charge of various services and only a few are mentioned here.

brick church by May 1919. Rev. A. C. D. Noe was the first resident minister and held the first service in the new church. In 1922 the Auxiliary bought the pews, the debt was lifted and the church was dedicated at the Convocational meeting held here in the fall, just six years after the first church was ruined.

The influence and service of Mrs. S. E. Morrill stands out prominent in the life of the church. For she was a staunch church-woman and literally a home missionary, exemplifying in all of her activities the highest type of Christian womanhood. She rounded out a beautiful life about two years ago but her deaching influence lives on and is still seen and felt in the lives of her church-people and friends.

This church has sent out one laborer in the Master's vineyard, Rev. J. N. Bynum, rector at Belhaven, of whom she is very proud.

The membership was nearly doubled during Rev. A. C. D. Noe's ministry and we gave him up last year to those Arkansas people with sad hearts but with love and best wishes.

Rev. J. W. Heyes accepted the call of our vestry in March of this year and Mr. Heyes and his family have already won our hearts and we feel that Emmanuel church, Farmville, will go forward rapidly under his ministry in advancing the Kingdom of our Lord.

HOW McLEAN SERVED THE FARMERS

The White House  
Washington, Feb. 21, 1921

Dear Mr. McLean:

I have your letter of the 18th of February, tendering your resignation as Assistant Secretary of the Treasury which I hereby accept, in accordance with your request, to take effect at the close of business on the 3rd of March, 1921.

Allow me to take this occasion to express my sincere appreciation of your efficient service in this important executive position, and also of your loyal and effective work as a Director and later Managing Director of the War Finance Corporation. In a fine spirit of unselfish patriotism, you accepted appointment as a member of the Board of Directors of the Corporation with the single purpose of serving your country to the utmost during the war. You have performed this war duty with signal ability and devotion, and you are deserving of a large share of credit for the successful operations of the Corporation. I have known, particularly from the three Secretaries of the Treasury with whom you have been associated, of the great value of your help and cooperation.

I am aware that you assumed the burden of the office of Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, in addition to your duties as Managing Director of the War Finance Corporation, at the urgent request of the Secretary of the Treasury with the patriotic desire of rendering every possible service to your government during this period.
