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PAREGORIC SALE STILL DOUBTFUL

Raleigh, Oct. 8.—The doubtful situation created by the special session of the legislature when it passed the Buck bill, designed to permit the sale of paregoric and like remedies in grocery stores, and upon which the attorney general recently ruled, has not yet been clarified.

Collector William Grisson, who must cause the license required for the sale of drugs under the federal narcotic law, is sitting tight under the threat of lawsuits from both sides and awaiting definite instructions from his superiors before following the ruling of the attorney general, which was given at the request of the federal authorities at Washington.

The Buck bill was passed with two amendments, one exempting towns and cities with established drug stores and the other taking out 26 of the 100 counties in the state, which are expressly declared to be under the law as it was before the bill was passed.

It is the 26 counties which are causing the trouble. The attorney general held that the definition of paregoric and other remedies as poisons by the state pharmaceutical board was without warrant of law and that therefore the lid is wide open in the 26 counties, towns and all.

Mr. Grisson had accepted the ruling of the pharmacy board at its face value and beginning July 1 had withdrawn all licenses from grocery stores. After the passage of the Buck bill, he re-extended the privilege to the country movements in the 76 counties, according to his interpretation of the law. Then came the ruling of the attorney general.

The collector has not actually had anybody tell him he would be sued, but mindful of his bond the requirement of the law "that every applicant must be duly authorized by the laws of this state," he thinks he should be protected by something more binding than the ruling of the state officer before he incurs the displeasure of the association of patent medicine manufacturers of the pharmacy board.

Accordingly, the matter has been laid before Revenue Commissioner David H. Blair for personal attention and upon his decision will depend what is to happen to the applications which are coming in from the 26 counties.

"There are 5,000 of these licenses and before I do something that the legislature may make me undo in January I want to know where I stand," stated the collector.
