NOTICE OF RE-SALE OF LAND

T. Flanagan and wife, Sarah Virginia Flanagan, to J. R. Davis, Trustee, for the Bank of Farmville, on the 8th day of December, 1922, duly recorded in the Registry of Pitt County in Book P-14, at page 583, the property hereinafter described will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder for cash, Thursday, April 16th, 1925, at 12 o'clock, noon, in front of the court house door in the Town of Greenville, N. C., said tract of land described as follows:
