## League of Nations Orders Inquiry Into Balkan Scrap

Commission To Be Sent To The Balkan States To Find Cause of Trouble

Paris, Oct. 27 .- The Council of the League of Nations will send a commission to the Balkans to investigate the cause of the Greco-Bulgar confliet. This decision was reached at a secret session of the council tonight, but the program as outlined is contingent upon compliance, by Greece and Bulgaria with the conditions of evacution and cessation of hostilities, laid down by the council.

The duty of the commission will be, first, to determine the facts, second, determine the responsibility, third, decide the question of indemnity, and fourth, study means to prevent a recurrence of similar outbreaks in the future. A report of the findings will be submitted at the next session of the council at Geneva in December.

The time limit of twenty-four hours within which the Greek and Bulgarian governments must order the cessation of all fighting and return all troops to their respective frontiers expired at 8 o'clock this evening and the council will reconvene tomorrow morning to deliberate on the replies, which are confidently expected to embody compliance with the demand.

Nevertheless, the league's executive body will not be satisfied until its military agents have duly reported that all troops have been in fact evacuated and all war-like measures abandoned.

M. Briand, president of the council, again warned the representatives of the combatants today that reliable information had been received that the cannon were still thundering.


