**FARMVILLE MARKET NOW
 NEEDS DOUBLE SALES.**

Every effort possible is being put forth to secure double sales in the near future to accommodate those wishing to sell their tobacco in Farmville, and it is hoped the big companies will grant this request. They have promised us double sales if we needed them—and if we don't need them now—with the rush season just ahead—then we will never need them.

Sales have been running continuously since the market opened with the buyers starting at nine o'clock in the morning and stopping at five in the afternoon, barely finishing each day's sale by quitting time; and since Wednesday the market has been in a block, only two houses getting a sale Thursday, with the same condition existing today. Many thousands pounds now on the local floors will have to wait until Saturday or Monday.

Farmville is losing tobacco every day on account of not being able to sell it, and now Mr. Tobacco Companies, IT'S YOUR NEXT MOVE — Farmville has proved to you double sales were needed. With double sales we will show you that this is a popular market.

More action and less promises is the only relief to help the situation. Did you mean what you told us? If so, send those buyers on at once.

THE CHILD AT SCHOOL
