The Music Memory Contest has become an annual event in several hundred cities and is now being made a statewide activity in several states in the general national awakening to the need of more and better music in home, school and community.

The thought of directing the attention of pupils in the schools toward a given number of standard selections of music for an "intensive drive," as it were, originated with Mr. C. M. Tremaine in 1916. It has proved to be a powerful factor in the efforts of schools, clubs, musicians and the general public in bringing beautiful musie as a cultural element in the lives of our youth, and also in raising the standard of appreciation of the world's best music.

It is safe to say that through the Music Memory contest several hundred thousand children have become interested in good music, have learned to know really fine compopsitions and some interesting facts about the great composers and their works. The gates of a new world of beauty have thereby been opened, which, when fully explored, will bring a knowledge of taste. and love for the beautiful in music. This in turn means added health, joy and happiness to our individual and

Schubert. Franz Schubert, an Austrian. the greatest song writer who ever lived. wrote his melodies, it seems, without effort. Much as an inspired poet writes his verses. In fact, Schubert was very clearly associated with poetry, and most of his songs are settings os poems of the great masters, Shakespeare, Goethe, Heine and others. "Hark! Hark! the Lark!" is a setting of the morning song, or Aubade, from Shakespeare's "Cymbefine." It is said that Schubert, on wandering into a cafe, found there. a volume of Shakespeare and was so impressed with the werds of this poem that he wrote this beautiful setting on the back of a menu card on the spot. It was written in 1826 and stands today as a model of song writing. The lover stands beneath his lady's window and calls to her in his love serenade. to awake and behold the beauties of the synrise. The meledy is bright and graceful, the rythm spirited and gay, the poem charming. One senses all the freshness of a morning in springtime, its blossoming trees, its twittering birds, and the gorgeous colorings of the sunrise. 

iver and Above Her Indebted. ness According to Figures-Given By Gov. McLean

Raleigh, Jan. 11.—The state of North Carolina is worth approximately fifty-six million dollars over and above its entire indebtedness, according to figures contained in Governor McLean's famous Balance Sheet submitted to the general assembly recently with the budget.

Liabilities of \$144,065,600 are offset by assets of \$200,054,865, leaving a capital surplus of \$55,989,265.

By far the most valuable asset of the state is the state highway system which is worth \$126,656,675, but the second most valuable piece of state physical property is the University of North Carolina plant at Chapel Hill, which is listed as being worth \$6,-492,414.

Rated fourth in value among the state's assets is the North Carolina College for Women, at Greensboro, which is listed as worth \$5,468,645.
