EMERALD ISLES STUDIED BY LITERARY CLUB

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John Holmes Makes Interesting Talk To Local Rotary Club

The Rotary Club of Farmville in regular session on Tuesday evening with twenty-one members present. John Holmes had charge of the program and gave a very interesting and illuminating talk on "Foreign Trade." Reaching back to 1910, he quoted statistics on our export of all principal farm products. Commenting on the sharp decline manifest in each instance, he said it was not necessary to look further for an explanation of the low prices prevailing in these products. The reason for the decline he attributes not so much to the depression as to world politics, pointing out that experts held up well until 1927. It is a systematic boycott of American war debts which, he says, is in a large measure responsible for our loss of foreign trade. Mr. Holmes brought out clearly that nations and peoples can no longer live unto themselves and that our situation will not be greatly relieved until our relationships with other countries are made friendly and enduring.

Bill Royster was inveigled into making that initiatory talk he so cleverly sidestepped on "Ladies Night" and told us of his pleasure in being in Rotary and his desire to become a useful citizen of Farmville.

The Club welcomed Alex House's guest for the evening, Allen Kendall, Raleigh newspaperman.
