The bullet did not strike the heart but taking an upward course punctured the left lung and the young man is in serious danger of contracting pneumonia from a blood clot, said by physicians to have formed in the lung.

No reason was given by the boy for the act in notes left for his mother and sweetheart, which stated simply that he "had nothing to live for." Burnette, a high school student, is around 20 years of age.

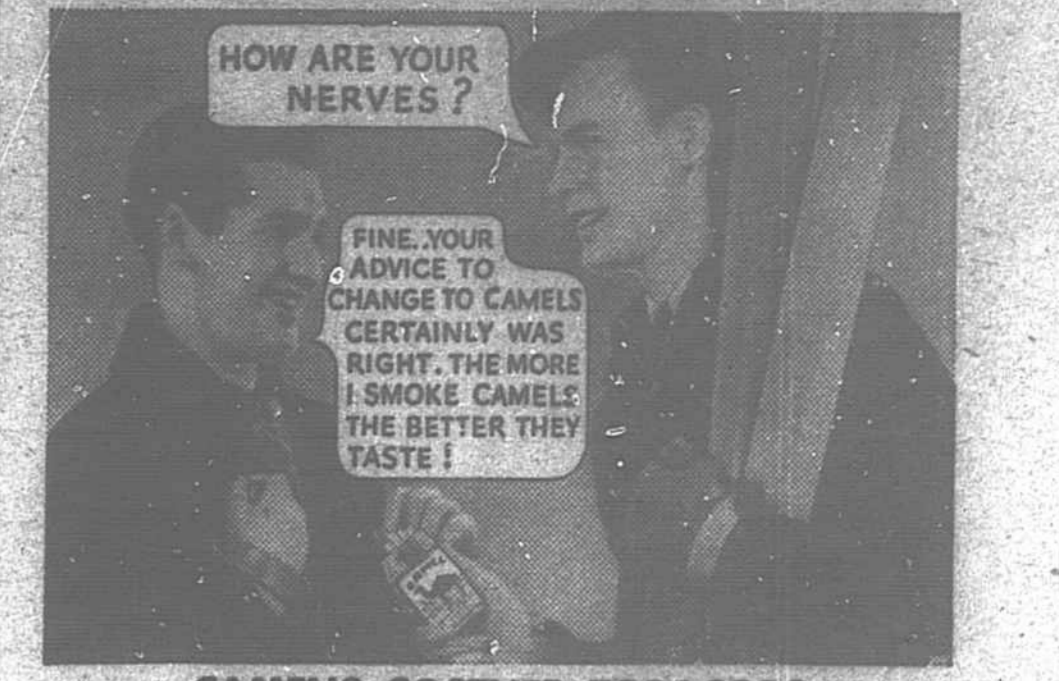
