Immediately after this meal the minutes of the previous meeting were read, followed by the report of the membership committee. John Lewis then reported as to the action taken by the town board in reference to the letter read by John Thorne on the previous Tuesday evening.

The program was turned over to the chairman of the program committee who, after reminding Alex Rouse that he was to be the program leader for next week, named John Lewis program leader for the evening.

John Lewis called on John Thorne to read, without comment, an article in the "Rotarian" entitled "The Road I Have Traveled." This article stressed friendliness and companionship as the foundation of all Rotary Clubs. It further stated that smiles are the badges of friendship and should be worn openly at all times.

A contest which showed how deficient the members of the Rotary Club were as regards their Confederate History, was sponsored by the program leader.

John Lewis took the balance of the time, during which he compared the ideals and ideas to which Lincoln adhered and those which are practiced by the barristers, attorneys, and solicitors that are contemporary with us.
