A separate bid for each separate issue (not less than par and accrued interest) is required. Sealed proposals will be received by the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the Town of Farmville, N. C., until 2:30 P. M. June 4th, 1936, at the Town Hall in Farmville, N. C., for Power Plant Equipment and a modern gravel wall type of deep well, enumerated as follows:

Furnishing, delivering and erecting two (2) Diesel Engine Generator units, one having a capacity of 500 K. W. and the other having a capacity of 300 K. W. or closely approximating these respective capacities, each complete with all appurtenances, accessories, switchboard requirements, etc.

One horizontal motor driven, centrifugal pumping unit with starting compensator.

One gravel wall type well with casing not less than 26 inches in diameter and approximately 500 feet

deep, complete with screen, pump and all appurtenances and accessories. Proposals must be marked "PROPOSAL FOR POWER PLANT EQUIPMENT AND GRAVEL WALL DEEP WELL", as the case may be. All proposals must be made on the blank forms for same provided in copies of the Specifications, Proposal and Contract.
