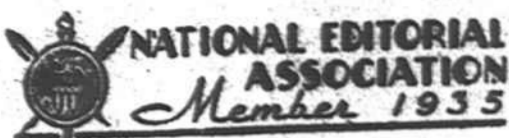

**Farmers Must Act  
To Earn Payments**

Farmers in other parts of the United States who normally plant a larger percentage of their farm acreage in soil improving crops than do farmers of North Carolina will likely share to a greater extent in the proceeds of the new farm program if North Carolina farmers do not act at once to comply with the new program.

This is the opinion of E. Y. Floyd, tobacco specialist at State College, who says that North Carolina farmers may offset this seeming advantage of other sections by replacing cash crops such as tobacco, cotton and peanuts with soil improving crops.

There is still some doubt in the minds of many farmers as to how to proceed to cooperate. The first thing to do, Floyd says, is to fill out a work sheet in which is listed the acreage of all crops grown on the farm in 1935, the acreage of each and other information about the farm. The second step is to work with the community committee to determine the soil-depleting base on each farm. Then soil-conserving crops must be grown on a part of this soil-depleting base. Fourth, soil building practices must be followed to earn the class 11 payments.

As a fifth step, the farmer makes a formal application for payment for what he has done, and finally his farm is checked to determine whether the conditions for payment have been met.

Floyd points out that only one payment will be made under the new program and this will include both soil-conserving and soil building payments. This payment will be made as promptly as possible after conditions have been met by the farmer. Since May 31 has been set as the date for county agents to receive work sheets, Floyd urges prompt action in taking this first step towards cooperation with the program.

By planting a succession of cereals, clovers and summer legumes, Hugh McRae, owner of Invershield Farm near Rocky Point, has found it possible to have year around grazing without the aid of permanent pasture.

**E. G. FLANAGAN'S  
Statement of Political Principles**

1. I favor the repeal of the Sales Tax, provided other sources of revenue can be found without taxing land.
2. My policy shall be to find sufficient revenue without burdening those least able to pay.
3. My record as a member of the House of Representatives shows that I opposed the General Sales Tax. I still oppose it.
4. I stand by the Constitutional Provision: That all property both real and personal bear its fair proportion of the tax burden and will work to that end.
5. I am in favor of the highest possible standard for the public school system; better pay for teachers; larger appropriation for schools and reasonable provision for sick leave.
6. I shall oppose legalizing gambling in any form, including slot machines, pin-tables and other devices.
7. I do not favor a return of the Turlington Act. The people will not support it. I shall support an effective law to control liquor sales by the counties, revenue sales to go to the counties, if voted on by a majority of the people of the county.
8. I worked for and supported the Australian Ballot Law. I do not favor absentee ballots.
9. I favor the highest degree of highway safety and shall support laws to make the highways safe.
10. I shall oppose a tax on land for State purposes, as such tax might consume the land.
11. I shall support farmers interest to control crops and increase their income.
12. I shall support a policy to preserve and protect our woods land.
13. I shall support measures to provide better pay for highway employees in the lower brackets.
14. I shall continue the fight that I started several years ago to recover for Pitt County nearly \$1,000,000 paid out by Pitt County to construct paved roads taken over by the state, and thus put our county on an equal basis with other counties to which refunds have been made for similar advances.
15. I shall support a policy to provide fair and better farm drainage to improve farming and health conditions.
16. I shall support a measure to provide free school books for the Public Schools.
17. I shall support a bill to provide representation on the Highway Commission from each Congressional District in the State.
18. I favor the enactment of a bill to pay Old Age Pensions.

The foregoing answers the substance of the inquiries made of me by publication as a candidate for the Senate and is published as information to the voters.
