Senator, governor and auditor Three are in the field for each of the positions of lieutenant governor, secretary of state and superintendent of public instruction. Only two candidates are seeking the posts of treasurer and commissioner of agriculture.

Instructions printed at the top of the ballots set forth: "1. To vote for a candidate on the ballot make a cross (X) mark in the square at the left of his name. 2. If you tear of deface or wrongly mark this ballot, return it to the registrar and get another."

They, will be forwarded to Raleigh at no expense to the veteran, and the check will be mailed from that office directly to the Pastor Baptist Church holder of the bond.

It is important that veterans DO NOT WRITE THEIR NAMES OR ANYTHING ELSE ON THE BONDS UNTIL THEY HAVE BEEN BROUGHT BACK TO THE POST OFFICE FOR CERTIFICATION.


