WINNERS IN THE NINTH ANNUAL COOPERATIVE ESSAY CONTEST TO MEET

Raleigh, July 2 .-- Competing for the State championship and first prize of a one-year tuition scholarship, the four district winners in the ninth annual cooperative essay contest will meet in Raleigh Friday, July 10, and recite their version of "Ten Important Questions in Regard to an Improved Agricultural Program and Their Answers," the subject of this year's contest.

These district winners have been selected in a series of school, county and district elimination contests in which thousands of rural boys and girls participated. The contest sponsored jointly as an educational project by the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative Association and the Farmers Cooperative Exchange. The contestants are: Lester Edwards, of South Edgecombe High School, representing the Eastern district; Raodolph Denton, of the Goldsand School in Franklin county, representing the central district; Harvey Barnes, of the Orrum High Schrool in Robeson county, representing the Southern district; and Jarvis Teague, of the Fines Creek High School in Haywood county, representing the Western district.

Washington, July 2 .- Members of the Democratic high command, in a three-hour conference with President Roosevelt, today laid the lines for a summer of heavy campaigning that they intend to climax in a whirlwind of activities next fall.

Beyond stating that the protracted parley had worked out a tentative budget and had brought a discussion of men to fill key campaign posts, the conferees declined, in the words of one, to "tell all."

Although the President two days ago intimated that Chairman James A. Farley of the Democratic National Committee might have an announcement as to whether he would resign as Postmaster General, Farley said the matter was not discussed today.


