Picking lint from diseased or fa ty bolls does more harm than go warns J. H. Moore, cotton technol ist with the central experiment s tion at State College. Such bolls should be left in

but little to the yield, while on other hand it tends to lower the qu ity of the cotton as a whole, Mo pointed out.

Moreover, it is hard to get go pure seed from cotton in which from bad bolls has been mixed w that from good bolls.

Seed for planting should be obta ed either from a reliable producer dealer or from only the best field the farm, he continued.

When seed is to be saved for pla ing, the elevators and gin sta should be cleaned thoroughly and seed should be caught on the clean floor.

This will keep the seed from be mixed with other varieties or with ferior seed from other ginning Moore explained.

Planting seed should be stor loosely in a dry, well ventilated pla Cotton should not be picked wh wet or green, he went on, but if is picked while damp from rain dew, it should be dried before it run throguh the gin.

#### **Pine Beetles Ravage** Many Valuable Trees

Southern pine beetles have been ravaging many valuable pine trees over North Carolina this summer, according to Rufus H. Page, Jr., assistant extension forester at State Col-

Beetles are most often found where pine debris was left on the ground of service if clipped and carried with to give them a breeding place, he

To breed in sufficient numbers to successfully attack and enter healthy trees, the beetles must first enter diseased or damaged trees or frshly cut pine stumps or pine debris.

Delaying pine cutting until the middle of September will check beetle attacks, Page continued. But if pines are being cut before that time, a number of precautions can be exercised to protect the living trees.

Remove all the trunk and limbs 6 of felled pines that are more than 6 two innches in diameter. Lop smaller limbs and brush and scatter well 6 so they will be exposed to wind and sunshine.

Peel all high, freshly cut pine stumps to ground level and burn or otherwise remove bark from the

Clear away pines that display a yellowish-green foliage and around whose base is found reddish sawdust-6 like material. "S-shaped" galleries in 6 the inner bark are a sure sign of pine beetles.

Remove from the stand all trees that are badly diseased, damaged, or otherwise weakened. Many infestations start from a single weakened

Cooperation among land-owners is necessary, as little good can be accomplished by cleaning one area if timber in adjacent areas serves as a source of infestation, Page worned.


