### A PAGE TORN FROM UNCLE WATT'S DIARY

July 2, 1881; President Garfield was shot at Union depot in Washington, D. C., 4:30 P. M., by Charles Guitau. I left there at 12:30 by train for Richmond, Va.

On July 2, 1888, 57 years after this memorable day wife and I left Farmville at 2:30 P. M., by auto for New Bern, by way of Ayden, Vanceboro; making a short stop at Robert Harris' home, four miles east of Ayden. Arriving at New Bern about five o'clock we took a ride over the city, noting the many interesting and historical things along the river front on the Neuse river, and reading placards which mark events of long ago.

Stopped by the Post Office and United States Court Building which rank along the class A. and afterwards wended our way back to R. F. Allen's home for a night's rest.

Sunday, July 3; After perusing the morning papers, some of the family attended the Methodist church. Next but not least we assembled around a well laden table for a gratifying meal.

At three o'clock we started for another sightseeing trip; our first stop was the National Cemetery, which is bedecked with white markers designating widows' pits where the heroes are slumbering in Nature's sweet repose, where Old Glory unfurls its starry, striped folds. Next, crossing the Trent river for a few miles we cast our eyes at the old breast works of Fort Totem, where the British cannon roared in 1770.

Then we visited the estate of Governor Speight, the first Colonial Governor of North Carolina.

Retracing our route, we made a Northern tour of the North side of the Trent, driging through the winding pathways amid the moss covered trees and the vine draped underbrush, perfumed by the wild rose, jessamine and honeysuckle, where the honey bee gathers his elixir.

Then we came to the silver stream of Fishing Creek, which is the Western boundary of Senator Simmons' estate, lately submitted to the Board of Engineers as a suitable site for the Veteran Home and Hospital, and which, personally, I consider to be one of the best and most fitting locations for Veterans to either live or die.

We arrived at home in the cool of the evening, being accompanied by F. L. and C. W. Allen, of Greenville.

July 4, 1888; Visited the historical Church, St. Thomas, Bath, and interesting points in Yatesville and Washington, returning home in the afternoon.


