 Lewis Is Laid
 To Rest Sunday**

**Highly Esteemed Woman
 Passes Suddenly
 At Home Near Farm-
 ville.**

Funeral services for Mrs. Effie Joyner Lewis, 55, well known and highly esteemed woman of this section, who died suddenly at noon Saturday, were held from the home near Farmville Sunday afternoon at four thirty, by the Rev. P. F. Newton, of Kenly, in the absence of Rev. D. A. Clarke, pastor of the Farmville Methodist church. The Rev. Mr. Newton was assisted by the Rev. C. B. Macburn of the Christian church, and the Rev. H. M. Wilson, Presbyterian minister.

Although she had been in ill health for some years, Mrs. Lewis was apparently as well as usual Saturday morning, being up and interested in a radio program prior to her sudden passing, which occurred on the day before that of her husband's, Samuel Taylor Lewis, a year ago.

Surviving are her mother, Mrs. Bertha Barrow Joyner; seven daughters, Mrs. E. C. Modlin, Norfolk, Va., Mrs. M. L. Gay of Walstonburg, Mrs. H. B. Baker, Mrs. W. E. Bagley, Miss Margaret, Miss Effie and Miss Dorothy Lewis, of Farmville; a son, S. T. Lewis, Farmville; three sisters, Mrs. T. W. Lang, Mrs. Bertha Gardner, Miss Bettie Joyner, of Farmville; five brothers, A. H., of Morehead City, R. S., of Chicago, Ill., T. E., R. A., and John B. Joyner, of Farmville and six grandchildren.

Born the eldest daughter of Mrs. Bertha Barrow Joyner and the late R. L. Joyner on February 8, 1878, Mrs. Lewis was reared about two miles East of Farmville, in a home noted for its serenity and Christian guidance.

As a young woman she was married to Samuel Taylor Lewis on December 20, 1906, and they made their home four miles West of Farmville—a home, which later became famous in this section for its general atmosphere of cordiality and the dispensing of hospitality equal to that of the old Southern plantations.

Mr. Lewis, known throughout Eastern Carolina as a man, who found the true formula for happy living to be a devoted husband and father and a charitable kindly and compassionate neighbor to every one, found in Mrs. Lewis a kindred soul, heart and mind, who spent her life also in devotion and service to family and friends, exemplifying throughout the attributes of Christian womanhood.

Mrs. Lewis took an active interest in the Farmville Methodist church, of which she had been a faithful member since early girlhood, and in the Farmville school, of which her husband was a trustee for many years. In recent years infirm health caused a decrease of activity but her interest in both institutions never lessened and is reflected in her daughter and son, several of whom are teachers and loyal church members. Blind for several years, her patience and Christian fortitude was a source of constant inspiration to her host of friends.

**AUTO-BICYCLE COLLISION
 FATAL TO JAMES HOWELL**

The lad, who was riding a bicycle, was returning to his home after completing a daily errand, carrying lunch to his father, an employee of the Farmville-Woodard Lumber Company. The Howell family, natives of Florida, Ala., moved their residence here from Greenville, S. C., about four weeks ago.

Beaman, is reported to have stated that he blew his horn as a warning as he was about to pass the boy, whereupon young Howell turned directly in his path.

The accident was declared unavoidable and Beaman was exonerated by a coroner's jury.

Funeral services were held from the Farmville Funeral Home Sunday afternoon at five o'clock by Frank J. Moore, Baptist minister, and interment was made in Hollywood cemetery.

Surviving are his parents and two sisters.

**Farmville Included
 In WPA Survey of
 Municipal Gov't**

This city will be one of more than 300 participating in the WPA survey of municipal government sponsored by the North Carolina League of Municipalities and the Local Government Commission, Mayor Geo. W. Davis announced yesterday.

The Mayor is a member of a state-wide committee of municipal officials who will assist in the survey, and has been appointed Chairman of a local administrative committee.

City Clerk R. A. Joyner has been appointed secretary of the Local Administrative Committee, the Mayor said. Members of the Committee were named by Mayor Ben E. Douglas of Charlotte, President of the League of Municipalities.

Members of the Local Administrative Committee, in addition to the Mayor and the City Clerk, are: L. T. Lucas, Haywood Smith, W. A. McAdams, John B. Lewis, Attorney.

The work of the WPA League project here will be under the Local Administrative Committee's supervision.

One to six WPA research workers will begin collection of information here sometimes soon, the Mayor said. The work will continue for several months.

Research workers will transfer information from city records to a 150-page schedule of forms which covers every phase of municipal government. Tabulations and analysis of data will be made by the project's staff of experts at Raleigh and Chapel Hill.

Each municipality, the Mayor said he had been informed, will be thoroughly studied by the survey workers. Data will be collected and analyzed on points of personnel and of the powers, duties, and limitations of officials. Each department of city government will be charted upon basis of practices and policies.

Special attention will be given to financial procedure and tax structures. Information for purposes of analysis will be collected on public works, municipally-owned utilities, and on costs of construction and maintenance of municipal properties. Important information concerning crime, mortality rates, and health statistics will be obtained for study in relation to expenditures for police protection, and in relation to education and municipal recreational facilities. Police and fire departments, and traffic problems, will be detailed.

The experts of the project will cross-analyze on a state-wide basis the facts disclosed by the survey in order to evaluate improved practices. Data on practically every phase of municipal government will be collected here, the mayor said.

The project will employ a maximum of 175 workers, 130 of whom will be taken from the certified relief rolls. The others are technical workers selected by the League of Municipalities. Fourteen University of North Carolina professors are among the nationally-recognized authorities who will assist in the analysis and publication of the findings.

The Mayor said the project's experts will analyze, digest, and chart all data obtained by the survey and from it prepare a comprehensive municipal reference book for city officials. A college text book and a high school text book will be based upon the facts revealed by the survey.

Geo. W. Coan, State WPA Administrator, a former city official himself has pointed out that not only has the project attracted statewide interest, but that it has received national attention already, and that the state and national offices of WPA are cooperating to the fullest extent.
