



The deductions for the plowing up of native sod and failure to prevent wind and water erosion will be essentially the same in 1939 as in 1938.

In counties subject to serious wind erosion in the Southern Great Plains area at least 30 per cent of the maximum payment for each farm is to be earned by carrying out soil-building practices. The purpose of this provision is to encourage adoption of wind erosion control measures in this area.

Soil Building Practices.

In general, the soil-building practices approved for payment in 1939 will correspond to those approved in 1938, although some changes will be made to better fit the program to the local needs of the States and regions. Appropriation for the 1939 Program.

The actual appropriation for the 1939 AAA Farm Program has not been made except the \$212,000,000 appropriation for price-adjustment payments.
