Farmville to Pass 14 Million Mark

Though Thursday's sales figures had not been completed at this writing, the total through Wednesday's sales indicated that the market would barely miss the 14 million mark Thursday.

Through Wednesday of this week Farmville had sold 13,709,002 pounds of tobacco for \$3,245,840.09; an average of \$23.60, one of the highest averages, if not the highest for the season in the entire belt. Farmville has been able to keep its average up with or above the larger markets in Eastern Carolina this season in spite of the fact that a few of them were selling much better tobacco. Reports of higher sales on other markets only indicated that that tobacco was superior to the grade being offered for sale in Farmville. Proof of this fact was shown here Monday when an exceptionally high grade sold for ninety-two cents per pound. With Farmville setting the pace in average with poorer tobacco, imagine what it could do if the best grades were offered for sale here. The market has had a few brakes of really good tobacco, but those breaks are as few and far between as the well-known hen's teeth. However, figures will prove that grade for grade no other market sells higher than Farmville.

Getting back to a few of these figures: Monday's sale of 771,850 pounds sold at an average of \$29.53, boosted the poundage for the season above the fourteen million mark. Though the sales were light on Tuesday and Thursday, 236,810 pounds and 114,068 pounds, the average of \$25.29 and \$25.39 on these days pulled up the season's average to its mark barely under \$24.00.

Through Friday of the eighth week last season, the week corresponding with this week, the market had sold 16,908,578 pounds at an average slightly above that of this season. Those figures have an advantage of two days' sales over the report issued for this week; Thursday and Friday not being included.

It is generally thought that next week will be the end of heavy sales for the season, but many believe that Farmville will reach its goal.
