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THOMAS JEFFERSON, DEMOCRAT

On the 13th of this month, occurs Thomas Jefferson, in 1743.

It is well for the nation to remember the author of the Declaration of Independence and the man who wrote the Statute for religious freedom in Virginia and succeeded in establishing the University of Virginia. These were the things for which he asked to be remembered, although the epitaph that he wrote for his monument made no mention of the fact that he was twice the President of the United States.

Jefferson was a democrat who believed in and cherished its ideals. Incidentally, he regarded agriculture as the best occupation for men and the foundation of all other wealth. He was a scientific farmer in his day and constantly endeavored to improve methods and introduce new crops.

It might not be a bad idea for Americans, in this day to become acquainted with the life, works and writings of Thomas Jefferson, "Sage of Monticello." In his life and in his thoughts are lessons for us all.
