Last rites for Jim M. Parker, 43, well known and highly respected citizen, were held Sunday afternoon from the Farmville Funeral Home, at 3:30 o'clock, by Rev. B. B. Fordham, Baptist minister. Interment was made in Hollywood cemetery.

The death of Mr. Parker, which was unexpected, occurred in a Greenville hospital Saturday evening, four hours after he was taken with a hemorrhage of the stomach.

Mr. Parker, a son of George R. and the late Mrs. Mollie Carraway Parker, spent most of his life in Farmville and this community, where he was usefully employed for many years as a mechanic, and had a reputation of being one of the most reliable and efficient garage men here. He was engaged in the garage business at the time of his death.

Surviving are two daughters: Marjorie Lee and Delphia Mae Parker, by his first wife, the late Mrs. Minnie Allen Parker; a second wife, Mrs. Inez Garrett Parker; his father, George R. Parker; six sisters, Mrs. A. H. Craft of Kinston, Mrs. John Moxingo, Mrs. Frank Tyson and Mrs. L. E. Flowers of Farmville; Mrs. Thomas Hamille and Miss Inez Parker of Falkland; two brothers: Jack and William Earl Parker of Aberdeen.
